PARTNERSHIP FOR STARTUPS

HIGHLAND SPRINGS INTERCHANGE PROJECT STUDY REPORT

On Tuesday, September 17, the Beaumont City Council approved a Cooperative Agreement between Riverside County Transportation Commission (RCTC) and City of Banning for the preparation of the Highland Springs Interchange Project Study Report (PSR).

The Highland Springs Interchange is in need of improvements to operate efficiently and handle the additional traffic from pending development that is sure to ensue.

The PSR will expand upon Beaumont's 2019 Traffic Impact Analysis for the Pennsylvania Avenue widening project which also studied Highland Springs. A more detailed analysis of the project and allow movement into the next phase, the project approval and environmental document (PA&ED).

DISASTER PREPAREDNESS MONTH

On Saturday, September 21, Beaumont City units from CAL FIRE/Riverside County Fire, Beaumont PD, Riverside County EMD and CHP gathered at the Beaumont Walmart to educate the public on preparing for disasters as part of National Preparedness Month.

Medic Squad 66, along with the Station 66 Fire Explorers, taught "Sidewalk CPR". This style of CPR is intended to educate the public on how to provide hands only CPR without the need to give mouth to mouth breaths to the victim. The compression method pushes remaining oxygen through the victims body keeping vital organs alive until emergency professionals arrive. Hands only CPR can double or even triple a person's chance of survival.

Over 175 people visited the educational booths and 76 people participated in the Sidewalk CPR training.

EMERGENCY ALERTS

Your safety is our top concern. Early warning helps save lives and property. That's why the City of Beaumont has implemented a state-of-the-art emergency notification system to alert citizens about emergencies and other important community news. The emergency notification system enables the City to provide essential information quickly in a variety of situations.

The process begins when the City issues a message about a potential hazard or upcoming event. Messages will be sent to all standard voice and text communication devices, including land line phones, cell phones, e-mail, and more. If you don't confirm receipt of the message, the system will try to reach your second contact and so on. The system will cycle through all contact methods provided until it receives a confirmation from you.

HANDS-ONLY CPR

fact sheet

Why Learn Hands-Only CPR?

Cardiac arrest – an electrical malfunction in the heart that causes an irregular heartbeat (arrhythmia) and disrupts the flow of blood to the brain, lungs and other organs – is a leading cause of death. Each year, over 350,000 out-of-hospital cardiac arrests occur in the United States.

- ♥ When a person has a cardiac arrest, survival depends on immediately getting CPR from someone nearby.
- ♥ According to the American Heart Association, about 90 percent of people who suffer out-of-hospital cardiac arrests die. CPR, especially if performed in the first few minutes of cardiac arrest, can double or triple a person's chance of survival.

Be the Difference for Someone You Love

If you are called on to give CPR in an emergency, you will most likely be trying to save the life of someone you love: a child, a spouse, a parent or a friend.

- ♥ 70 percent of out-of-hospital cardiac arrests happen in homes.
- ♥ Unfortunately, only about 46% of people who experience an out-of-hospital cardiac arrest get the immediate help that they need before professional help arrives.
- ♥ Hands-Only CPR has been shown to be as effective as conventional CPR for cardiac arrest at home, at work or in public. It can double or even triple a person's chance of survival.

Music Can Save Lives

- ♥ Hands-Only CPR has just two easy steps: If you see a teen or adult suddenly collapse, (1) Call 911; and (2) Push hard and fast in the center of the chest to the beat of the disco song "Stayin' Alive."
- ♥ People feel more confident performing Hands-Only CPR and are more likely to remember the correct rate when trained to the beat of a familiar song.
- ♥ During CPR, you should push on the chest at a rate of 100 to 120 compressions per minute. The beat of "Stayin' Alive" is a perfect match for this.

Take 90 Seconds to Learn How to Save a Life

- ♥ Watch the 90-second video. Visit heart.org/handsonlycpr to watch the Hands-Only CPR video and share it with the important people in your life. You can also find a CPR class near you.

NOTE: The AHA still recommends CPR with compressions and breaths for infants and children and victims of drowning, drug overdose, or people who collapse due to breathing problems.

EV CHARGING COMING TO BEAUMONT

The City of Beaumont has awarded a contract to Baker Electric for the construction of an electric vehicle charging station.

The State of California has set a goal to have five million electric vehicles on the road in California by the year 2030. The biggest challenge as identified by the state is the availability of fast-charging stations. To help increase the availability of fast-charging stations, California has increased grant opportunities available for this purpose.

Beaumont Transit was awarded multiple grants for the design and installation of a fast-charge electric vehicle charging station. The charging station will be located in the Beaumont Civic Center parking lot, adjacent to the police station on Orange Ave. This location is ideal because it is centrally located within the downtown area, its close proximity to government buildings, its serviced by several public transit routes, and because it is the site of an unofficial park and ride location.



SIDEWALK VENDING

In September 2018, the California legislature passed Senate Bill 946 which decriminalizes sidewalk vending. The law took effect January 1, 2019, and applies to all general law and charter cities in California.

On Tuesday, September 3, the Beaumont City Council approved an ordinance amending Title 5, Chapter 5.64 of the City of Beaumont Municipal Code to be consistent with SB946.

The following are a couple of the most notable regulations to the Sidewalk Vendor Ordinance:

- All sidewalk vendors are required to obtain a permit from the City;
- Permits will be effective for a one-year period from the date of issuance;
- Sidewalk Vendors shall display copies of all City, County, and State permits;
- Vending Carts shall not exceed a length of four feet, a width of four feet, or a height of ten feet.


The intent of the regulations is to benefit the City and lead to orderly commerce while encouraging entrepreneurship and providing economic opportunity for people to support themselves and their families.

WASTE MANAGEMENT BILLING CHANGES

Effective July 1, 2019, Waste Management of the Inland Empire assumed billing for trash services in Beaumont. Residents now pay WM for refuse (trash) service and continue to pay the City of Beaumont for sewer service.

Visit www.wm.com and create an online account by selecting "Pay My Bill" at the top to help manage your Waste Management account. Please also be sure to review the notices included in your City bill for service updates and other important information.



FAQs

Q: Why am I paying Waste Management for trash?

A: As part of the City's renewed contract with Waste Management (WM), we have asked that they assume billing for trash service for all services.

Q: Am I going to be paying more now that WM is billing me?

A: No, the new WM contract states that rates will remain the same until June 30, 2021.

Q: What was I paying before?

A: You were paying \$49.98 every two months and you will continue to pay \$49.98 every two months until June 30, 2021.

Q: My bill says "due upon receipt" is there an actual date?

A: Similar to your City bill, your trash bill is due 30 days from the billing date listed.

Q: What am I paying to the City of Beaumont?

A: The City of Beaumont will continue to bill for your sewer service.

**Remember sewer is what goes down the drain, not what comes out of the faucet.*

Q: Did my sewer rate go up?

A: Yes, sewer rates increased per the approved rate study. Details can be found on our website.

SCE VEGETATION MANAGEMENT

As part of SCE's ongoing wildfire mitigation efforts and enhanced vegetation management program, tree service contractors will be in Beaumont inspecting and trimming trees/vegetation, along identified electric circuits, between September and December of 2019. The community may notice an increased presence of SCE tree service contractors in the community.

In high fire risk areas, the work includes creating a minimum 12-foot clearance at the time of trim between trees and SCE's power lines to prevent vegetation from coming into contact with electrical equipment and potentially sparking a blaze. In addition, tall trees up to 200 feet from the wires will be assessed and may be removed if they demonstrate a high risk of falling into the lines or have vegetation like palm fronds that high winds could carry into power equipment.

Q. How will I know SCE is going to trim my trees?

A. SCE conducts annual inspections of trees and vegetation near lines. If a tree is identified for "light pruning," the customer will be notified via door hanger 30-45 days prior to maintenance. A second door hanger is provided within 24-48 hours prior to scheduled maintenance. The door hanger provides a phone number the customer can call for more information. Customers with trees that require "heavy pruning" will be contacted in person by SCE to discuss a pruning plan.

Q. What happens when you have to remove a tree?

A. SCE confers with the property owner to explain the tree removal process. An SCE tree trimming crew will cut down the tree at no charge to the customer. The crew will dispose of the tree or, if the property owner chooses, cut it into firewood.

**SCE TRIMS TREES TO KEEP YOU SAFE**

SCE trims trees near power lines as a free service to customers to keep the public safe.

Trees will be trimmed to create a minimum **12-foot clearance** from a power line at the time of trim.

HOW WILL I KNOW IF MY TREE IS BEING TRIMMED?



A door hanger will be posted **30-45 days** prior to trimming



A second door hanger will be posted **24-48 hours** before trimming.



Customers will be **contacted in person** if **heavy pruning** or **tree removal** is required.

The door hanger will list a contact number to call to discuss the tree trimming plan for your property.

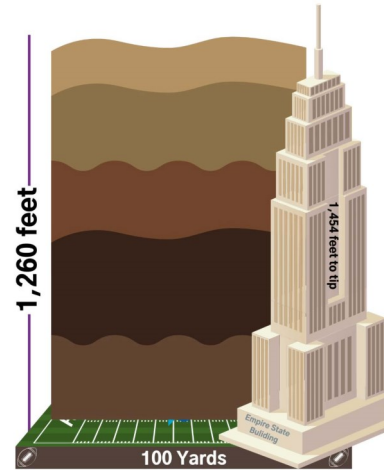

State Route 60 TRUCK LANES

SR 60 TRUCK LANES - WEEKEND CLOSURE AHEAD!

A 40-hour closure of both lanes on westbound Route 60 and one lane on eastbound Route 60 will take place on **October 12 at 4am to October 13 at 8pm** to allow crews to remove large rocks from the hillside. This closure is needed for the safety of crews and motorists in the project area. Drivers should plan ahead and use I-10 as a detour.



Did you know...

Crews are excavating 2.1 million cubic yards of dirt. That's roughly equal to a football field piled with dirt as tall as the Empire State Building! POTRERO INTERCHANGE



The phase 1 of the Potrero Interchange is nearing completion over SR60. Once open, the overcrossing will provide access from Oak Valley Parkway to 1st Street. Design Plans for Phase 2 of the project, which include on and off ramps, are 95% complete. Funding for the ramp phase includes a pending application for a BUILD grant through the Department of Transportation (DOT). Notification of award is expected by mid-November.

TRAVEL TRAINING - Union Station & Olvera Street

Forget about gas prices, traffic and paid parking, Beaumont Transit will show you how to travel Southern California without a car!

Beaumont's final Travel Training of 2019 will take place on Wednesday, October 30th to LA Union Station. Upon arrival in Los Angeles, training participants are given a tour of Union Station and several hours to explore the area on their own. Instead of giving cash handouts, it's important for community members to find truly transformative solutions to help those in need. There are many organizations across the City, the County, and beyond that support homelessness and their efforts directly benefit the homeless population. We encourage our residents to seek out those organizations and if you choose to give donations, then choose programs that support real change in the community.
