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



Fire Station 66's Push-In Ceremony


On September 3, coverage was coordinated to capture the Push-in Ceremony for Fire Station 66's new 2025 Spartan Smeal Type I Fire Engine.

2025 State of the City

Website Assistance

Website assistance was provided to automate processes for the following departments:

- **Police Department** - Seeking a self-registration tool for users to schedule appointments for Live Scans, allowing office staff to dedicate more time in responding to other non-emergency calls.
- **Community Development** - Incorporating frequently asked questions as trained responses within the website's Chatbot system to provide timely responses for residents and other stakeholders.



Critical Mention



Critical Mention was integrated as a new software tool to provide real-time media monitoring and analysis across many digital platforms - including online news sources and social media. This software will allow staff to monitor feedback by using keywords across different media types and specific markets.

Staff Recognition

Following a successful internship and a WRCOG fellowship with the City, **Princess Cunanan** was selected to continue their work as the department's new Communications Specialist.



This role will support graphic design, videography, and community outreach efforts.





FIRE PREVENTION Key Updates

A presentation from CAL Fire will review the Subdivision Map and go over the requirements for Banning and Beaumont based on the new FHSZ Maps forthcoming.

The application for the 2026 Fire Risk Reduction Community List was completed on September 30, demonstrating the city's commitment to wildfire mitigation and community safety.

SFM Shepard attended a free Advanced WUI training, 3-day training September 23rd, 25th, and 30th.

A meeting was held on September 24 for the County Fire Guideline and Policy Review.

FSS Johnson will attend the upcoming training on October 5 to review Significant Code Changes occurring in Corona.

The 2025 CA Fire Code adoption process will begin on the October 7 City Council meeting.

PLANNING

Upcoming Initiatives

Work is underway on a comprehensive zoning code update to align with the Beaumont 2040 General Plan. This effort will streamline project review and processing while supporting the City's long-term vision.

Regency Center's Oak Valley Village

Staff received and routed a plan for review: 23,299 sq. ft. "Shell Only Building" for Regency Center's Oak Valley Village, west of the upcoming Target.

Beaumont Pointe Annexation

The Beaumont Pointe Annexation has been finalized, officially bringing this area within the City of Beaumont's boundaries. This expansion marks an important step in the city's growth, providing opportunities for enhanced city services, improved infrastructure, and stronger community connections for residents and businesses in the newly incorporated area.



NutriShop

Staff welcomed the new ownership of NutriShop, a supplement shop and wellness center, to the community.

Key Updates & Milestones

Staff participated in mock interviews (Sept. 17) and the **College & Career Expo** (Sept. 30) at Beaumont High School.

The City will begin updating the **Economic Strategic Plan** in October, with opportunities for public engagement planned throughout.

The team is assisting **several independent restaurants** that are seeking to expand or relocate to downtown.

The lease agreement with the Inland Empire Small Business Development Center was approved by the Council on September 2. Carpet installation is complete, **tenants are moving in**, and a ribbon-cutting ceremony is planned for early November.




Hispanic Heritage Celebration


ZACH TAYLOR – CORPORAL

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

A department restructure occurred. The department completed a comprehensive review of our staffing model and organizational structure to ensure alignment with best practices and the recent California POST Management Study. The analysis identified an opportunity to realign Public Safety Dispatching from the Support Division to the Operations Division. As dispatch operates 24/7 alongside patrol, this change created an opportunity to add a second dispatch supervisor to the team to provide seven-day-a-week supervisory oversight to improve operational coordination and ensure the division structure accurately reflects the emergency response nature of dispatch operations.

Milestones & Key Updates

On September 24, the City kicked off the **Downtown Beaumont Revitalization Project** with GHD Engineering, starting the studies—traffic, drainage, pedestrian walkability, and more—needed for the Preliminary Design Report.



In September, curbs, center medians, and street-level storm drainage were installed as part of the **Second Street Extension Project**. Construction is ahead of schedule, and the project is nearing completion. The contractor anticipates finishing by the end of **October**.



On September 4, the City held the Pre-Construction Meeting with the contractor for the **Sports Park Expansion Project**. Construction is expected to begin around mid-November due to extended lead times on key equipment, with the contractor scheduling work around the delivery of these items.


Milestones & Key Updates

On September 23, the City completed the **feasibility study** and 30% design for new sidewalks on the south side of 8th Street (Xenia Ave to Allegheny St), providing a safer route for children walking to school. Next steps include coordinating right-of-way, utility pole relocation, and realigning this street segment.



The westbound right-turn pocket lane on **Oak Valley Parkway onto northbound Cherry Avenue** has been converted into a through lane, following a traffic study that identified this as the best use for improving flow.

The City completed the **1st Street Widening Feasibility Study** and presented it to the City Council on September 2. The study outlines the engineering and environmental impacts of widening 1st Street into a four-lane road.





Project Launch Update

We've officially launched our year-long Comprehensive Operations Analysis (COA) to evaluate and improve Beaumont Transit services, including routes, Dial-A-Ride, bus stops, and potential new options like microtransit. We're in the early stages—collecting data, gathering driver feedback, and developing a community engagement plan. Public input will be key, so watch for surveys, pop-ups at community events, and our upcoming project webpage for updates and ways to get involved.

Quarterly SIU inspections were performed.





